

Core knowledge Knowledge linked to learning outcomes	 Prehistory - The period of time in the past before people could write Human - We are human but there have been different 'types' of human, over time, including Neanderthals Homo sapiens - The scientific name for modern humans. Homo means 'man' and sapiens means 'wise' Hunter gatherers - Groups of people who get food by hunting, fishing, and foraging rather than by farming Climate - The weather conditions in an area over a long period of time (during the last ice age, the climate in Britain was extremely cold) Tools - The first stone tools were made 3.3 million years ago Village - A group of houses where people choose to live near each other Agriculture - Farming Fossil - The preserved remains of plants or animals 1. How long ago did prehistoric man live? I can recognise that prehistory was a long time ago and was the beginning of the history of mankind.
